

Medical Emergency Response Training November 20 – 21, 2019 Machu Picchu, Peru

Conservation Volunteers International Program (ConservationVIP®) organized and coordinated under the authorization of the Ministry of Culture a program of Medical Emergency Response training during November 20 – 21, 2019. The training was led by two volunteers Debbie Crane, RN, BSN, CSTR, and Kevin Crane, PE, JD, First Response SAR. They had previously participated in the June 2019 ConservationVIP

volunteer trip to Machu Picchu: Both of these very special volunteers were so impressed with the volunteer program at Machu Pichu that they decided to return to provide no cost emergency responder training to prepare the staff for medical emergencies in Machu Picchu.

The training took place during November 20 and 21, 2019 at the Cultural Center of Aguas Calientes, Machu Picchu. The project was authorized by Mr. Jose Bastante, Director of the Machu Picchu and Mr. Miguel Zamora, Park Administrator. A total of 105 employees attended the training, 63 on the first day, 42 the second. They were trained in immediate response to medical emergencies. In addition, the Cranes brought with them from the U.S.A. a large amount of emergency medical supplies that they themselves managed to collect from several sponsors, including a defibrillator donated by ConservationVIP, and all of these were donated to Machu Picchu Park.

During both full days of training; Machu Picchu staff were first introduced to Conservation International Volunteer Program by an orientation PowerPoint presentation by Trip Leader Milagros Flores-Roman who also served as a Spanish translator during the two days of training. This was followed with the emergency responder training which was delivered thanks to the participation of the two volunteers who first presented the theoretical part through a PowerPoint presentation and oral discussion followed by practical exercises. Attendees were divided into four groups to learn together, discuss, decide the best response actions to perform and make a group presentation for each topic.

Among the first emergency response topics covered on the training were: Cardiopulmonary resuscitation, basic principles of stabilizing broken bones, evaluation and treatment of unstable joint injuries, evaluation of the patient with spinal cord injury mechanisms and how to stabilize prior to transportation. Then they moved on to unstable pelvis injury, severe bleeding, nailed objects, hypothermia, heat problems, dehydration, lighting strike, acute mountain sickness, snake bites, chest pain, stroke, and medical issues associated with diabetes.

In total, the instructors and translator contributed 48 hours of volunteer time during the volunteer training.

During the training, the two volunteer instructors donated a large quantity of equipment to help establish a professional emergency care response program at Machu Picchu Sanctuary. In addition, thanks in part to generous donations from prior trip volunteers, ConservationVIP® was able to donate a defibrillator to Machu Picchu.
